



UNIFORM UPDATE

GIRLS' WINTER UNIFORM



As previously reported in eLink, most winter uniform items arrived at Bolton's during the school holidays.

- **New, tailored blazers** are a polyester/wool blend and feature a striped braid around the entire edge of the garment. The lining features 3 pockets, one with a zipper and one with a button.
- Green, which is not one of the School colours, with input from the Board, has been removed from the **girls' winter skirt** and **tunic**.
 - The fabric has changed from a tartan to a stripe with 4 pleats front and back, as opposed to on the sides.
- The new style **winter blouse** has a more opaque fabric and features navy detailing on the collar and buttons (not shown in image).
- The **new school tie** is plain navy with a small, gold Girton insignia at the bottom.
- The only difference with the new **jumpers** is the V-neck which now features an overlap instead of a centre stitch.

A SPORTING CHANCE LIKE NO OTHER



In what is believed to be an Australian first, Girton Grammar School has implemented a modified and inclusive sports program for young people with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), aimed at students within the school and from the broader Bendigo community.

A Sporting Chance Program is part of Girton Grammar's co-curricular program, with volunteer students working alongside teachers, acting as mentors and coaches and introducing participants to the specific language, rules and skills that are related to many popular sports played within schools.

Founder and Director of A Sporting Chance Program, and Physical Education teacher at Girton Grammar School, Mr John Doherty, said that months were spent researching, planning and preparing to implement the program, which works on many levels.

"We are now into our fifth year of running A Sporting Chance and so many people are benefitting.

"The ASD participants learn new skills, make new friends and gain confidence, which is particularly challenging for those who are sensitive to noise and touch. "At the best of times the schoolyard can be noisy, unpredictable and chaotic, so modifying the environment to suit students with ASD is essential if they are to gain the full benefits of participation in sport.

"We currently have 14 Girton student coaches who experience and develop a real sense of empathy, patience and humility whilst building up an incredible rapport through working with their 'buddy' participants.

"Parents of the children in the program also benefit by being able to connect with one another and enjoy a small but well-earned break each week," Mr Doherty said.

Louis Beale from Bendigo Special Developmental School is 16 years old and after four years in A Sporting Chance Program, has managed to improve his social skills and confidence in ways his mother did not think were possible.

"This program has helped Louis to go on to be part of a mainstream Tap Dancing and Musical Theatre group at CV Dance Studio and we are eternally grateful to all of the wonderful Girton student coaches and teachers," said Ms Natalie Beale, Louis' mother.

Several other participants in A Sporting Chance Program have gone on to join mainstream sports teams, allowing participants to enjoy a fuller life, having gained confidence and appropriate social behaviours.

There is an open invitation extended to Parents and Friends to visit and see these artworks that add so much colour to the walls. The exhibition will remain on the walls for the coming month.



Plain English Speaking Award Opportunity

The Plain English Speaking Award (PESA) is a public-speaking competition for students aged 15-18 years (enrolled in at least one VCE subject). PESA provides an excellent opportunity for students to build self-confidence and extend their skills in oral communication, speech writing and research.

The competition encourages students from government, Catholic and independent schools to speak to their peers from other schools on topics they are passionate about.

In Australia each year state and territory committees organise and conduct competitions at school, regional and state levels. State winners then go to the national final, which is held in the various states and territories on a rotational basis.

In Victoria, PESA is organised and conducted by the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority. The Australia-Britain Society generously sponsors the Award.

Girton Grammar is hosting a Regional Final of the Plain English Speaking Award on Wednesday 24th May, 9.00am — I.00pm. Girton can enter two students in this Regional Final. The format of the competition is to deliver a prepared speech on a topic chosen by the student (5 minutes), and to deliver an impromptu speech on a topic set by the assessors (2-3 minutes). Using World War II and the Holocaust as an example, the exhibition demonstrates the impact of discrimination through personal stories, encouraging understanding and empathy for minority groups and for people experiencing disadvantage. The students watch an introductory video before hearing from a Holocaust survivor. Students were then divided into smaller groups and guided around the exhibition before undertaking group work.

EARTH'S END AND YOUR SURVIVAL:TERM I "2021" YEAR 9 CHALLENGE

THE SCENARIO

Today humanity uses the equivalent of 1.6 planets to provide the resources we use and absorb our waste. This means it now takes the Earth one year and six months to regenerate what we use in a year. The result is collapsing fisheries, diminishing forest cover, depletion of fresh water systems, and the build-up of carbon dioxide emissions, which creates problems like global climate change.

The Solution

To leave Earth as a member of a shuttle crew that has managed to escape from Earth before global conflict destroys the planet. You are scheduled to rendezvous with a mother ship on the moon. However, due to mechanical difficulties, your ship was forced to land on the nearest planet. During re-entry and landing, much of the equipment aboard was damaged. Your survival depends on creating a new settlement and colonizing your planet with as many people as possible.

Session 1 involved the ten planet groups completing a number of survivortype activities, including physical and mental challenges and creating a tribal flag based on each planet.

Session 2 required each planet group to design a marketing campaign (presented in Session 3). Mr Beever from the school marketing team spoke to the Year 9 students and offered guidance during the session.

During Session 3 each planet had to present their marketing campaign to all Year 9s and then vote on the planet with the best marketing campaign.

DAY ONE

On Tuesday March 14, the 2017 Girton Eco Marathon Team consisting of students Myles Blum (12 AH), Tyrone Moloney (12 FR), Karl Ferrari (11 FR), Benjamin Pignataro (12 FR), Robert Wood (11 JE), Connor Mc Caig (11 JE), Montague Velthuis (12 MI), Team Manager Mr Robin Kirby, Teacher Mr Rod Smith and Technical Advisor Old Girtonian, Lucas Kirby departed from Girton for Melbourne airport to start their journey to Singapore.

After boarding the Qantas flight at midday, the Team settled back for 7 hours of excited contemplation as they headed toward the 2017 event.

Our arrival in Singapore was without incident but upon collecting our luggage it was noticed that one piece had not arrived. After checking with ground staff it was confirmed that the item was nowhere to be found and a further search by the airline was required. Luckily, the bag was eventually located and delivered to our hotel the following day.

A short trip to our accommodation, a quick dinner and it was off to bed to recharge the batteries after the flight.

DAY TWO

Team registration was scheduled to commence at 11am, so our eager troupe boarded the shuttle bus for the short trip to the Changi Exhibition Centre were the event was to take place.

After registration formalities, it was required that all teams' shipping crates were inspected for dangerous goods prior to being permitted to unpack the vehicle. After passing that test with no dramas, the Team set about preparing the vehicle for the mandatory safety and technical inspections. This process is extremely stressful as you hope that you have not missed or misinterpreted any aspect of the comprehensive set of rules.

As the 6pm conclusion of inspections arrived, the Team had passed 8/10 of the various tests with only 4 relatively minor items that needed further preparation to meet the standards, a decision was made to pack up and return early the next day to remedy the minor issues.

Dinner at a local eatery concluded the day with great anticipation of passing the final tests early on





Thursday and hitting the track for practice later in the day.

DAY THREE

Prior to dawn on Thursday, driver Ben Pignataro and Team leader Robin Kirby boarded the shuttle bus from our hotel to the venue for the compulsory driver briefing at 7 am sharp. The briefing outlines the schedule for the day, any HSSE issues that have arisen, reinforcement of the track and pit area rules, notification of any teams that have committed violations of track or pit rules and a general



wrap up of the previous day activities.

Attendance at the briefing by the driver and team manager is mandatory, with the gates of the meeting area being closed at precisely 7.00am and any driver and/or team manager not present results in that team being denied access to the track for the day!

Back to the pit area and the Team quickly had the issues rectified that had stalled the passing of our vehicle the previous day. The vehicle was soon re-inspected and to the delight of the Team, the "passed" stickers were applied and we were officially clear to enter the competition.

The Team soon prepped the vehicle and headed out to the track to make their initial practice lap.

Our strategy for the first run was for our driver Ben to become accustomed to the track, test the high/low speed controls and complete the required laps within the 29 minute maximum time limit window.

Our first run went pretty much like clockwork and the confidence of the Team reached an all time high.

As late afternoon approached, it was decided to pack up our pit area in readiness for another practice run the next morning on day 4 as well as an opportunity to put a valid competition run on the board when official runs commenced on Friday afternoon.

The Team retired for dinner and contemplated the strategy for day 4.

DAY FOUR

Friday commenced with the driver / team manager meeting and an overview of the days' schedule and a number of violation notices being handed out. Drivers were given a refresher on track rules in readiness for the start of competition

A practice session was scheduled for mid-morning and the Team





went about prepping the vehicle prior to being given clearance to enter the track. After a strong start, the vehicle proceeded confidently around the circuit and completed the 10 laps just inside the 25 minute limit.

With 2 solid runs under their belts, the Team were confident that a competitive run could be put on the board when official attempts were commenced later in the day. Unfortunately, prior to the start of competition, storm clouds rolled in off the ocean and the subsequent thunderstorms dashed any chance of a competition run being allowed.

The Team then decided to tidy their pit area prior to travelling into the city to take in the sights, sounds and smells of Singapore by night.

After visiting many high end stores on Marina Bay and making the odd purchase. All members of the Team commented on how extremely clean all areas were and the spectacular evening skyline. Team members then boarded the metro rail for the trip back to the hotel in readiness for competition the next morning.

DAY FIVE

With the start of competition today, each Team member was bristling in anticipation of what kind of performance could be achieved when our vehicle finally hit the track in anger.

After waiting in the queue for more than an hour it was soon our time to enter the checking and fuelling area prior to being given clearance to the track proper. The pre attempt checking involves weighing of the driver to ensure they meet or exceed the 50 kg minimum, in our case, Ben was under weight so a selection of steel bars were added to his weight to meet the 50 kg minimum, these bars would then be bolted to the vehicle prior to each run. The vehicle is then fuelled up,

seat belts checked and the brakes subjected to a test for efficiency.

With all preliminaries complete it was time for Ben to perform his craft for our first competitive attempt. The vehicle started well and had soon completed one lap, then two and so on until the requisite 9 laps (reduced from 10 laps due to the extreme heat & humidity) were completed.

Post attempt checking revealed an elapsed time of 24mins 55 secs, a mere 5 seconds inside the time window. Fuel checking revealed that we had used 36.8ml of Ethanol and with temperature correction, a result of 415km/ltr was achieved.

The Team were suitably impressed that the vehicle had successfully completed a valid run, a result that had excruciatingly eluded the Team last year.

Once back in our pit area, work quickly began to check over and prep the vehicle for the next competition session later in the

day. A check of the engine spark plug revealed that the fuel settings were a little rich, so an adjustment was made to the engine fuel control module to effectively remove 2% of the ethanol being delivered to the engine, this adjustment should produce a significant improvement in the fuel economy without pushing the engine over the edge.

After once again joining the long queue in the staging area, it was

soon our turn to go through the checking formalities prior to entering the track. The Team were quietly confident of an improvement to their first attempt and as the vehicle effortlessly moved off the startline, all members had their fingers and toes crossed for a great result.

At post attempt checking, the vehicle was 19 seconds inside the time limit window, had used 35.9ml of fuel and after temperature correction, equated to 428km/ltr. The adjustment had made only a slight improvement much to the dismay of the Team.

During the group discussion that followed, it was suggested by Tech Advisor Lucas Kirby and unanimously decided that a radical move was necessary for our next attempt. This would involve making a significant change in the fuel settings that would result in either a positive or negative change to the fuel economy achieved. It was concluded that we would change the fixed throttle opening from 30% to 60% which would allow the engine to produce more power and accelerate quicker to the pre-set top speed and reduce the time that the engine was running, hence lowering consumption.

The Team quickly prepped the vehicle and headed to the pre attempt checking area. After the start was given, the vehicle powered away with the extra power but

failed to complete 1 lap. The vehicle was soon back in our pit area and a thorough examination revealed that a small magnet, approximately 6mm in diameter had come away from the engine flywheel. The magnet is a crucial part of the engine management system in that it triggers a sensor each revolution to maintain the engine spark and fuel injection cycle. Luckily the magnet was located clinging to the vehicle frame and was quickly reattached more permanently ready for competition on the final day.

As the Team headed back to our accommodation there was a noticeable increase in optimism among the group albeit very tired from a frenetic paced day and a measurable lack of sleep the night before.

DAY SIX

Sunday marked the last day of competition and the last couple of opportunities to move up the overall leader board for our







category. After the two successful attempts on Saturday the Team was sitting in 7th position of the overall 50 entries in the group of "prototype, internal combustion engines (ICE)", a great result for the Team at that point.

With the vehicle ready for action and the fuel system adjustments in place, the Team headed for the checking area and were subsequently brought to the startline. When Ben was given clearance to start the mighty Honda roared in to action (well, as much as a 35cc engine can roar) and moved briskly around the first bend and out of sight. Confidence rose each time that the vehicle crossed the finish line of each lap and Ben was able to consistently complete each lap averaging about 0.15 seconds deviation from lap to lap, a fine demonstration of driving and control skills.



The attempt was completed with only a tantalising 4 seconds to spare, a close shave to say the least. Once inside the post attempt checking area, the driver is reweighed, brakes rechecked and the fuel consumed is calculated it was revealed that the vehicle had consumed 28.65ml of fuel and after temperature correction; the final result was 500.6km/ltr, a very significant step up from the previous 2 attempts.

Buoyed by the outcome, the Team round tabled a decision to open the throttle position from the current 60% to 100% in a last ditch attempt to better our result since it was clearly demonstrated on the last attempt that this was the direction that we needed to go in.

The Team quickly prepped for the next session and fronted the checking area with great anticipation of improving their overall result.

When cleared to start, the change

to the fuel settings was clearly noticeable as the vehicle propelled itself swiftly from the startline and was soon up to its coasting speed. After disappearing around the first corner, Ben advised that there was an unfamiliar noise coming from the engine compartment and that it was difficult to restart after reaching the lower limit of the coasting cycle. A decision was made to abort the run and return to our pit area to remedy the problem prior to our last opportunity to improve our performance.

A quick check of the engine revealed that a component in the clutch system had worked loose. After pulling the clutch assembly apart, the offending part was replaced and the vehicle was soon ready for its final attempt of the event.

The Team then headed back to the checking area and were cleared to go, a mere 9 minutes before the close of the final session. After strongly leaving the startline, there



seemed to be a problem with the clutch in that it would not freewheel when the engine was not running and hence not allowing the vehicle to coast after reaching its predetermined upper speed limit.

The only course of action was to abort the run and muse about what could have been. The Team as a collective were very disappointed to not see the result of the change to the fuel system which should have propelled the result to well over 600km/ltr and moved the Team higher on the leaderboard in the overall rankings.

While the Team were lining up for their last attempt, they had a visit from 2 judges for the Technical Innovation award. This award is recognition of the quality and ingenuity of a device or devices designed, built and featured on your vehicle that could contribute to achieving an increased fuel economy or enhance the overall performance, with the view of possibly being implemented on everyday vehicles in the future.

The requirement is that the idea and its evaluation are submitted to the Shell Eco Marathon review panel prior to the event and then a discussion is had with each team with a submission. The discussion with the Team centred on the concept that we had on the vehicle, how it was designed and built as well as any test result evaluation conducted. Further, the Team were asked about future uses and projected fuel savings that could potentially be realised with the concept.

The device was designed and built last year by Year 12 student, Lucas Kirby and basically uses waste heat from the engine exhaust to generate electricity that is in turn fed back into the vehicle to reduce the electrical energy taken from the onboard battery. Though not crucial in the 2017 competition, the 2018 competition will mandate that all electrical energy used from the battery will be taken off your fuel economy to give a true value of total energy consumed by the vehicle. Hence the potential value of the device for next years' competition and moreover, the potential to incorporate the device in everyday vehicles and possibly do away with the fuel consuming alternator as the source of power to keep the vehicle battery fully charged.

Following the discussion with the judges and indications given, Team members were sure that they were well in contention but were not aware of what other teams had submitted.

Since competition had officially concluded, the Team rallied to pack the shipping crate with all of the spares and tools before carefully placing the vehicle inside. A mandatory check by the shipping company was required to ensure





that no dangerous goods were in the shipment and soon we were given the final ok to bolt the lid down and seal the crate for its flight back home.

With a couple of hours to spare before the awards ceremony, the team elected to go back to their accommodation to kick back now that all the work was completed. Towards evening, the Team then returned to the venue for the awards ceremony.

After all results were tallied, our 500.6km/ltr put us in 9th position overall out of 50 entrants in our category. Clearly a stellar result given that the Girton team was one of just two high school teams in the whole competition, the balance being university age students, I guess it's akin to an under 18 team playing in the seniors!

The "off track "awards were then

announced and to the delight and sheer amazement of our group, we were announced as the winners of the Technical Innovation Award and the Team was presented with a fine trophy and a cheque for \$3000 USD. Truly a great acknowledgement of the ingenuity involved in the Thermo Electric device and one of only three awards of its kind presented each year across the world, the other two being at similar events in Europe and the US.

After the formalities were concluded, the Team travelled back to their hotel where they planned out the last day of their trip.

DAY SEVEN

Monday soon came around and the Team gathered prior to setting off to downtown Singapore. Some of the Team still had items on their shopping lists and others just wanted to see the sights prior to the evening departure back home. After filling in most of the day at various stores and markets, everyone was ready to head back to our accommodation, pick up our bags and make our way to the airport.

A short 7 hour flight back saw the Team touchdown in Melbourne at 6.15am, somewhat bleary eyed and lacking sleep but glad to be safely back in Melbourne, then on the bus for our return to Bendigo.

In what can only be described as a fantastic result, the whole Team can be commended on their diligence and persistence in building, testing and training during last year and leading up to the event this year as well as their overall behaviour, humility and teamwork ethic at the event.

They did their country, their school and more importantly themselves proud at this prestigious world level event.

Finally, the whole project would not have proceeded nor been as successful if it weren't for the assistance with funding, products,

services, time and intellectual know how given freely by so many generous individuals and firms.

As we dream about the 2018 event and imagine the possibility of perhaps taking two vehicles, one for the ICE category and build a new one to compete in the battery electric category, we trust that we call upon our current group of supporters and capture some new support to make our 2018 aspirations a reality.

Withdrawal of Students

Parents are reminded of Point 4 of the Business Regulations regarding withdrawal of students. 4. WITHDRAWAL OF STUDENTS

To withdraw a student from the School, at least one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation, must be given in writing to the Headmaster. If the required minimum notice of one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation period (in writing to the Headmaster), as described in the following examples, is not given for withdrawal from the School, a Tuition Withdrawal Fee equal to one tuition fee instalment will apply. There is no Prompt Payment Discount for a Tuition Withdrawal Fee. For example:

(a) Students leaving at the end of the school year (except Year 12 students) or during the following vacation or during First Term the following year will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster no later than 5 p.m. on the last school day of Third Term (in September).

(b) Students departing at the end of second Term or during Third Term will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster by the last school day of the First Term. Please also note that once the signed enrolment Form is received, and the first instalment of the Capital Fee is paid, the student is deemed to be enrolled in the School. Hence the notice of withdrawal period as described in Clause 4 is required to be given if a parent subsequently decides not to proceed.










YEAR II OUTDOOR EDUCATION CAMP





The last week of term I was Camps' week for most students in Years Seven to Eleven. For those students who are interested in making imagery there was an excellent Art camp that focused on experimental techniques and the portrait as the subject matter.

Lee-Anne Trewartha a local artist who is now exhibiting widely in Australia was the Tutor for the camp. Her work has been included in major Australian Art prizes and despite her success she is a modest person. Lee-Ann is also an Old Girtonian and for those who would like to know more about this artist

the Old Girtonian Website has a comprehensive article about her.

Students initially made a three dimensional head sculpture from paper clay, that they then photographed and manipulated the image using Photoshop. These images were the starting point for experimental drawing using pen and charcoal.

The students then set up mirrors and worked on self-portraits. These drawings became the basis for experimental painting with a limited range of colours and with multi layers of images created on A3 transparencies as well as monoprints.



The application of paint with tools other than brushes provided the participants with the opportunity to think beyond the traditional approach to making imagery, but it did take a little while for them to feel courageous enough to let go of their comfortable well-tried techniques.

Overall it was a really innovative camp and the only down side was the small number of participants. From an initial group of six students only three arrived. However they were three quietly enthusiastic students who produced reams of work, of which the work shown here is a sample.



This was an excellent exercise because the students learnt how to improvise thinking on their feet solving the technical and artistic challenges and the pressures there and then. They also had to deliver a final edited product under a tight timeline. These are common features in a television production environment.

Joseph recently competed at the Australian Athletics Age Championships in Sydney in the Under 20 high jump.


He placed first with a jump of 2.22 m, which broke the meet record set in 2006 by 4 cm.







EDUCATIONAL AND PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES 2017



Our School's Pastoral Care system includes my specialised services which include consultancy, counselling and educational assessments for students of all ages in both the Junior and Senior School.

The consultancy services involve regular meetings with the Pastoral Care team throughout the School. Staff present student issues for discussion and support plans are made collaboratively.

Counselling Services may be initiated by parents or staff. This generally involves matters which are complex, and possibly requiring Mental Health Care Plans from General Practitioners. Such issues may include stress management, separation, anxiety, depression and grief.

Educational Psychology assessment work may also be initiated by parents, but may also occur following teacher concerns being expressed to their Head of House, LRC staff or following consultation with myself. Early identification of Specific Learning Difficulties can do much to address student skill levels and to assist them achieving their potential.
