### FROM THE HEADMASTER

t is important for Schools to understand the educational priorities of current and future parents. What are the things that people value most in regard to the education of their children? Recently the School conducted a perceptual research survey of 200 randomly chosen Girton parents and 200 non-Girton parents to ascertain various parental values, expectations and opinions about education for their children.

Not surprisingly the research showed that the three most important things to current Girton parents in order of priority are:

- 1. academic focus and opportunities (Sports, music, language programs, future opportunities, VCE results)
- 2. school community and culture
- 3. a focus on student wellbeing

Most people in our community would agree that these are three areas of the School that we are constantly striving to support and improve and we will continue to do so with renewed conviction.

Also emanating from the report were a few findings which came as a surprise to us and I would like to share these with you.

Firstly, 25% of Girton parents were not aware of whether Girton produces better or worse academic results than Victory Christian College.

Secondly, 27% of Girton parents felt that Catholic College Bendigo produces comparable academic results to Girton.

For some of you, we've been hiding our talents under a bushel!

Girton Grammar tops the region convincingly for VCE results each year and we expect this to continue. Last year our median VCE ATAR was 81; 32% of our Year 12 VCE students ranked in the top 10% of the State; 51% of Girton students ranked in the top 20% of the State.

Girton's VCE results place it in the top 50 Schools in Victoria – (ranked 47, out of 528 VCE providers). As a comparison, the next highest ranking School in the region is ranked at number 209.

Last year our results placed us ahead of many of the large independent schools in Melbourne who generally dominate the ATAR rankings including Xavier College, Brighton Grammar, Carey Grammar, Geelong Grammar and Camberwell Grammar.



We were also surprised to find out that, despite having a much higher percentage of our students go on to Tertiary studies than any other school in the region, we are not perceived to be the school that best prepares its students for University.

Each year between 98 and 100% of our departing Year 12 students go on to further study. The rate of Girton students not completing their University courses is far lower than the Victorian state average of 15% (source: Department of Education and Training Higher Education Statistics). Our students are exceptionally well prepared to take the next step after school.

The market research also confirmed some things that we already know because we see it reflected in our students every day. This includes loyalty and overall satisfaction. The parents in our community believe they are receiving the best available schooling across all areas that matter to them and are confident that their children are getting the best education possible.

This positive attitude and belief in the education that parents are choosing for their children is immensely powerful. It has an impact on our School culture that is difficult to measure but impossible to over value and it is an absolute privilege to experience its influence every day.



As we go through stopping and learning we stop in a room. We being lost in the mine.



### GETTING TO THE STEM OF INNOVATION: 2016 SCIENCE WEEK







Girton Grammar School has started Science Week with a very intentional drip, announcing that their team of Year 10 Science students are the overall winners of the 2016 Amazing Spaghetti Machine Contest, for design and construction of an ingenious plant-watering invention.

Coordinated by the Melbourne School of Engineering, The Amazing Spaghetti Machine Contest is an annual competition open to Year 10 students in Victoria, who put their knowledge and skills in Mathematics, Science, Engineering, and Project Management to the test in the creation of a 'spaghetti machine' - an overly complex machine or device that is used to perform a relatively simple task.

Mr Matthew Maruff, said that winning the Melbourne University competition was the perfect start to Science Week.

"This is the fourth time our Year 10 Science students have won this Award so it's inspiring to see the sustained interest and effort in Science at the School.

"We have also won the 'People's Choice' Award in this competition three times and will continue to encourage our Science students to immerse in Science beyond the classroom through activities such as this.

"The automatic watering machine that the students built is impressively engineered but the teamwork required to build it is equally remarkable." Mr Maruff said. The winning Spaghetti machine is on display at the School for the duration of Science Week and to keep inspiring fellow students to become immersed in STEM (Science Technology Engineering Maths) subjects, the Girton Racing Team is also displaying their high-tech Energy Efficient Vehicle.

The vehicle was raced in the prestigious Shell Eco Marathon earlier this year in Manila, where the team was the only Australian Secondary school selected to compete in this international event.

The team hopes to be selected to compete in the event next year in Singapore and is currently modifying their vehicle design to travel even further on less fuel.

Mr Matthew Maruff, said that the students hoping to go to Singapore are strong in Mathematics and Systems Engineering.

"Team members are currently working on enhancing the existing ethanol fuelled vehicle by reducing drag and overhauling the ergonomics of the cockpit and controls for greater driver efficiency.


"Designing, building and testing this futuristic Energy Efficient Vehicle exemplifies the STEM skills that will be required of our innovators of the future.

"The team hopes to minimise the electrical energy consumption on components such as the electronic fuel injection system and starter motor.

"You won't see an Energy Efficient Vehicle in this country built by school students more advanced than this one," Mr Maruff said.



### Wind Symphony/ Senior Concert

Both Wind Symphony and Senior Concert Band were awarded recognition for their performances at the Victorian Schools Music Festival which was held for the first time in Bendigo this year. This festival runs for a duration of a few weeks in Melbourne, Geelong, Ballarat and Bendigo. In order to be recognized for a shield, the ensembles must fulfill criteria which address musical elements and presentation.

Wind Symphony performed 'Indah Pagi' which was based on a Balinese village featuring the percussion section, and the flute players were required to add an element of atmosphere with the use of recorders. The other piece that they performed was 'Dynamo' which encapsulated hustle, bustle and energy which was received with energetic applause from the audience. They were presented with a Gold Shield.

Senior Concert Band performed for the first time on the Ulumbarra stage. They were required to present two pieces of repertoire from the VSMF syllabus and although there was a sense of uncertainty to begin with, they soon found their confidence and represented themselves very well receiving a Silver Shield. This ensemble is a training ensemble where students develop their fundamentals and skills to allow them to then move into ensembles such as Symphony Orchestra, Wind Symphony and Big Band.

There has been a lot of hype surrounding a new game which was released last Saturday August 13. Available on PC and PS4, "No Man's Sky" is set in a massive galaxy. "We also wanted to provide the opportunity for young people to profile their work, receive public and financial recognition and support further studies in their chosen arts field."


"It's very clear to me that we have some talented emerging artists in Greater Bendigo and I would like to thank everyone who entered this year's awards," said Cr Fyffe.


Film - "TREAT YOUR STRESS"

Meet the Filmmaker is a new ELink initiative where Girton students are given a voice and interviewed regularly throughout the year to tell it how it is in their own words recounting stories as young emerging filmmakers and their most recent projects.

Adam's short film "Treat Your Stress" was a major achievement taking out first prize for the Digital Media category at Raw Arts.

It was screened at a recent performance assembly to an enthusiastic reception with introductory speeches from Adam, Gabriel Holmes (who collaborated on the film with Jarrah Tokovic), Mr John Phillips Digital Media Teacher and special guest speaker; Mr David Stretch, Business Development Manager at Greater City of Bendigo.

Mr David Stretch has extensive experience in cinema exhibition and events and ran one of Australia's oldest and most cherished independent single screen cinemas in the country for 10 years, the Theatre Royal Castlemaine.



### MEET THE FILM MAKER

He highlighted the imperative of encouraging young filmmakers to exhibit their film works at every opportunity. He discussed the rapid changes in film technology, distribution and new, fully immersive initiatives such as UK company Secret Cinema who combine and reinterpret reality style events with a traditional cinema experience and present classic and contemporary cinema in a very special way.

The film was also warmly received at a screening for Girton's Performing Arts Showcase evening recently.

Adam is interviewed as part of the "Meet The Filmmaker" series and he had this to say:

What made you get started in making films? What was the main inspiration?

"...Probably the Digital Media class ....joining in early Year 11 ...and the first SAC was filmmaking. I enjoyed the lot of it.....mmmm.... films not at school....the first set of filmings I did were at Gabriel Holmes' house ...we made a short story about the problems of teenage drinking....that was the first film..."

How did the storyline and script for the Treat Your Stress film project come about?

"...I had a first idea.....but it didn't happen because the actor couldn't turn up on the day....we had no time left so I had to write another script to fit in.....to film at Jarrah's house ...he's the main character for "Treat your Stress". So I made a script in 15 minutes and we got to shoot it in a day"

So you're good at improvising?

"..Mmm...I can make up something on the spot...it takes me a long time to change something that I don't really like because I usually like the original ideas..."

What was the greatest challenge you faced as a Director making this film?

"....Probably communicating with actors...so if I tell a character to do something then they will interpret it in a different way to myself... the technique I had to get it done in a certain way is; I'll tell actors what to act but I won't tell them the storyline so they won't have their personal interpretations..."

That's very clever. What were the highlights making this film?

Laughs "...Definitely winning the Raw Arts I guess..."

That affirmation?

"..Yeah..Yep.."

You're very talented and it was terrific...everyone was very, very pleased for you.

"...Thankyou...."

Tell us about how you put the production team and cast around you to make the film?

"....I just in-boxed my friend....I needed his family to be involved....I told him to ask them...it was fine for them to be in my film which turned out to be really smooth..

Did you have to shoot most of it yourself?

"..Yes definitely......because it was the first time shooting a scripted film with my camera and using certain equipment I bought which was a camera slider and a steadicam...and no one really knew how to set it up so I had to film it.." You were under a bit of pressure? "..Yes definitely.."

What have you got planned for your next film?

"Gabe, Jarrah and I have written a type of philosophical film ....we have started it but not very efficiently but we are going to ask Henry Evans to work with us... he's an older Girtonian....for him to come and help us."

That would be a great collaboration. It's also very interesting how Gabe is reading very inspirational books and material at present.... It could put a new slant on your films.

"Yes definitely.."

It's very good that as a director you are open to drawing in stuff from around you then putting that together. You won the main Digital media Prize for Raw Arts Festival, that's a really impressive achievement. How did you feel about that and where do you think it could take you as a filmmaker?



the edges and kind of creates the feeling of engaging with the shots he makes. Mmm...yes."

Yes it was quite revolutionary what he did with all those different formats and changing aspect ratios. I know it drove cinema projectionists crazy!

"Yes"

Your editing is another standout as a filmmaker what advice can you give other young filmmakers when editing?

"Well, I'm more of a camera operator than an editor but...I don't know...."

As you shoot are you editing in your mind?

"Well I kind of...before I make the film ...I have a storyline in my head and I don't really do much with after effects so...I guess its just....I will try to film everything that I need to film but I would put in some more later....after making the film I will go back to what I've done and try to see what I need to add ..... I think that's really important.... it's like more of a refinement ...which I've learnt from visual communications study

and folio work. I've put in that aspect into the filmmaking and cinematography process and I think it helps a lot."

Yes it does, it's what they call "pick up shots" when in production.

"Yes"

Do you think storyboarding helps you get out of that problem?

"Umm yes, I still had a few missed shots in "Treat Your Stress" ..... I didn't have time to film what I had missed so I kind of changed the style of the film to certain things because it was a really short film... it wasn't too hard to catch up I guess."

Ok, what about the soundtrack? How did you do that?

"The music I used at the end was from a composer called "Weird Inside" and the track is called "Wishing Well" (This can find it at Youtube and Soundcloud)

"The sound effects were a mix of samples that I put together and I had an idea in my mind what sounds I wanted so I put key words into a search engine and I listened to a lot of different types of samples and sound effects. I would download some things I wanted

and change their durations, pitch, speed and made them fit into the film soundtrack."

We heard you decided to set a special goal for yourself. You would work in Japan on your holidays and save up for a special camera. Tell us about the technology you are using and why?

"I worked hard to purchase the Panasonic GH4 camera which I've done and it's a really small camera but it can film up to 4K resolution which is very good (2K and 4K are cinema standard). It's a micro four-thirds format and I can buy many adaptors for different lenses and brands of lenses. This is very effective and gives me a lot of flexibility."

Is there anything else you would like to say? Do you think being here at Girton has led you to the discovery of a love of filmmaking?

"Yes definitely. I thought taking ICT Digital Media classes would be something I would be interested in but I was never interested in the filmmaking side and I think....I'm really glad what I've found what I like to do."

That is fantastic to hear.

"I definitely appreciate what Girton and the course has given us."

If an Application Form and Fee are received, parents will be contacted, in order of receipt, and invited to arrange an Enrolment Interview. This will normally start to occur approximately twelve to eighteen months prior to the year of entry. An offer for a place in the School will follow if vacancies exist.

### Withdrawal of Students

Parents are reminded of Point 4 of the Business Regulations regarding withdrawal of students. 4. WITHDRAWAL OF STUDENTS

To withdraw a student from the School, at least one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation, must be given in writing to the Headmaster. If the required minimum notice of one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation period (in writing to the Headmaster), as described in the following examples, is not given for withdrawal from the School, a Tuition Withdrawal Fee equal to one tuition fee instalment will apply. There is no Prompt Payment Discount for a Tuition Withdrawal Fee. For example:

(a) Students leaving at the end of the school year (except Year 12 students) or during the following vacation or during First Term the following year will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster no later than 5 p.m. on the last school day of Third Term (in September).

(b) Students departing at the end of second Term or during Third Term will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster by the last school day of the First Term. Please also note that once the signed enrolment Form is received, and the first instalment of the Capital Fee is paid, the student is deemed to be enrolled in the School. Hence the notice of withdrawal period as described in Clause 4 is required to be given if a parent subsequently decides not to proceed.

### The Academic Merit Scholarship: (Means Tested)

Available to students entering Years 5 - 9 in 2018

This is a means tested scholarship for Academic Merit. The Academic Merit Scholarship will be awarded to good all-round students who demonstrate strong academic ability through ACER testing and good performance at the subsequent interview of short-listed candidates.

Students will be considered for a means tested scholarship for entry into Years 5-9 if they can demonstrate the following attributes:

- 1. They are students who have achieved strongly in the ACER scholarship test. It is expected that students offered this scholarship would be able to achieve an ATAR in excess of 90 in the VCE.
- They are students who have a conscientious attitude towards their studies. Their school reports indicate that they try to do their best in each of their subjects

- 3. They are students about whom it would be said that they lead positively and well in the classroom, the playground and the wider community. They may not hold formal leadership positions but they model good citizenship behaviours.
- 4. They are students who have some interests outside the classroom. These interests could be in fields such as sport, music, dance, drama, community service, church activities or other areas of interest.
- 5. They are students who will participate enthusiastically in the many opportunities a Girton education will provide and who will proudly represent themselves as a member of the Girton community through their presentation and behaviour at all times.
- 6. Holders of an academic scholarship, at the Headmaster's discretion, may be required to repay part, or all of the fees saved by the provision of the scholarship, if they depart the School before the end of Year 12.
- 7. Once a student is registered for the ACER examination the school will send further details regarding the examination date, time and scholarship process.
- 8. The Headmaster is the sole decision maker in respect of the award of the Scholarship. The Headmaster will not enter into any correspondence or discussion about the success or otherwise of a candidate. He reserves the right to modify the award, or not to award, at any time as he sees fit.



This is a wonderful opportunity to catch up with other Old Girtonians and to see the school in action.







### EDUCATIONAL AND PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES 2016



Our School's Pastoral Care system includes my specialised services which include consultancy, counselling and educational assessments for students of all ages in both Junior and Senior School.

The consultancy services involve regular meetings with the Pastoral Care team throughout the School. Staff present student issues for discussion and support plans are made collaboratively.

Counselling Services may be initiated by parents or staff. This generally involves matters which are complex, and possibly requiring Mental Health Care Plans from General Practitioners. Such issues may include stress management, separation, anxiety, depression and grief.

Educational Psychology assessment work may also be initiated by parents, but may also occur following teacher concerns being expressed to their Head of House, LRC staff or following consultation with myself. Early identification of Specific Learning Difficulties can do much to address student skill levels and to assist them achieving their potential.


