











### FROM THE HEADMASTER

They are essential contributors to the health and vitality of any community and the strongest communities almost invariably connect young people productively with other youth and other adults.

Last weekend, in what has become a strong tradition at the school passed on through the generations of students, around 300 Girton students doorknocked, manned static collection points and organised fundraising activities to assist The Salvation Army in its vital community work.

Community service is highly valued at Girton and built on an incredible history of generosity in and from the school, and based on an understanding that when we do good for others, we feel good about ourselves. Our students are reminded often that they are privileged to attend this School and with that privilege comes responsibility to themselves and others. Our job is to empower each student to realise their own potential as citizens of a global village and to constantly ask them to lift their gaze to alternative horizons.

This idea of teaching children to question and to look ahead was beautifully demonstrated by a group of Prep students, who this week visited my office for story time. In the book I read to them, the story's sly antagonist, a wolf, cuddles up with an unsuspecting rabbit to write a book together, prompting one of the six year old students to declare; "I don't like where this is going, Mr Maruff."

I hope this simple insight from this wonderfully imaginative student, blossoms into a generosity of spirit that can only come from understanding another person's perspective and the context in which other people exist.

Equally, I hope that the bright-eyed students who asked me why I have a couch in my office and why there is a big plate on my wall, keep asking questions of the world around them, just as they see it.

In the last couple of weeks there have been many outstanding efforts by students. Seven debating teams ranging in age from Year 8 to Year 12, competed in two events each at the latest round of the Debating Association of Victoria (DAV) school's competition. During the competition, Girton won 8 of the debates and claimed best speaker on 8 occasions. The Year 12 debating team consisting of Alexander O'Shea (12 Aherne), Kavindu Hathurusinghe (12 Jenkin), Milos Babovic (12



Jenkin) and Alexander Nielsen (12 Millward) remains undefeated in this year's DAV season of debating.

Congratulations to James Humphry (10 Millward) who has become the Bendigo Academy of Sport Athlete of the Year. Among other achievements on the water, James has been selected for the Australian canoeing team to compete at the Junior Men's world championships in France.

The Intermediate Boys Volleyball team played in the School Sports Victoria grand final and came runners up, making them second in the State for their sport. Well done to all who participated.

On the national stage, Tully Scanlon (11 Jenkin) has earned a spot on the Australian boxing team and is currently training for the Youth Commonwealth Games to be held in the Bahamas in July, after being crowned the Australian youth 52kg champion.

As the winter months encroach and many of our activities move indoors, now, ironically, would be a perfect time to book your ticket for A Midsummer Night's Dream, and to enjoy comedy in health-giving doses at the Capital Theatre from June 20 - 22.

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Melbourne Football Club visited Bendigo this week and Girton was fortunate to have ruckman, Jake Spencer, and midfielder, Aaron Vandenberg, visit the school.

Junior School students had fun learning new football drills and Senior Sport Science students learnt what it takes to compete at the highest level.



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A group of enthusiastic Junior School students are trading their pens for power tools during lunchtime and are part of a new Woodwork Club being run by Grade 4 teacher, Ms Michelle Rey and Senior School Head of Technology, Mr Rod Smith.

Ms Rey's father was a builder and Mr Smith was an engineer before becoming a teacher, so the students are in extremely good hands, with Head of Junior School, Mr Don Thompson, also lending an experienced hand.

Ms Rey said that after seeing a documentary about the benefits for children of working with wood, she was inspired to start the club.

"There are so many benefits of lunch time clubs for students and of working with wood in particular.

"The children are using maths skills in the measurement and design of their project and learning a whole new vocabulary around this enjoyable task.

"Working with 3D shapes in wood fosters a range of skills and ways of thinking that are an excellent foundation for the all-important STEM subjects at school and in the workplace," Ms Rey said.

About 16 boys and 10 girls are currently participating in the Junior School Woodwork Club which is held at 'the pub' – the Senior School headquarters for the practical Technology subjects. From Year 9 onwards, technology based subjects range from Product Design and Technology through to Systems Engineering and Computing, all of which can be carried through to VCE. With more than nine Technology subjects on offer in the Senior School, the Junior School woodworkers will have many options in the future.

Ms Rey explained that the Woodworking Club was also about supporting social skills in children.

"For some children, they would like a nonsporting option at lunchtimes and this is one activity offered to Year 5 and 6 students.

"They make friendships with children in different year levels. At the moment they are making pencil cases and we hope to ignite a passion for hands on craft," she said.

Grade 5 student, Alexis Muir, said that she decided to join the Woodwork Club because her Dad is an engineer.

"My Dad is into woodwork so I wanted to know what it is. I like the nailing bit and I'm going to use the pencil case that we are making in Grade 6," she said.

Jack Woodhams, also in Grade 5, has other ideas for how he will use his pencil case.

"I will use my pencil case to keep a reptile in it.

"I wanted to join wood work because I like building stuff and my Dad was a chippy. I love building stuff because I am inspired by my Dad," he said.

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

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

## ALADDIN REVIEW



## Aladdin (Melbourne)

Disney Live's 'Aladdin the Musical' has exceeded even the highest expectations in a vibrant, whimsical masterpiece guaranteed to leave the audience astounded. Its perfect balance of witty humour, beautiful, rich orchestral pieces and dazzling choreography are truly an asset to the animated film of 1992 (directed by Ron Clements and John Musker) and its monumental set design has transformed 'Her Majesty's Theatre' into an Arabian palace of light and wonder.

The brilliant craftsmanship of this multi-award nominated stage musical resides with Alan Menken (music), lyricists Howard Ashman, Tim Rice, and Chad Beguelin, and director/choreographer Casey Nicolaw as well as many others who poured their hearts and souls into creating this phenomenal masterpiece.

It can safely be said that their hard work has not gone to waste as every aspect of this theatrical triumph has contributed to its brilliance - with its harmonious orchestral scores, well-paced dialogue, witty lyrics, bold dance routines, ambitious stage sets and of course it's elaborate costumes, all working together to create a show never to be forgotten.

Bringing all this to life in his powerful voice, energetic stage presence and hilarious comedic timing, Michael James Scott's charming, charismatic 'Genie' is an absolute joy to watch - lighting up the stage with his sassy wit and jazzy personality. During musical numbers James Scott moves flawlessly between expressive storyteller and rich harmonic vocalist, with a beautiful tone that resonates powerfully throughout the theatre. This is particularly notable in the song 'Friend like me' where his captivating vocal expression is combined with a vibrant orchestral accompaniment, including rich brassy blasts and jazzy piano chords that work to complement his incredible tone.

Ainsley Melham's great dancing ability, melodic voice and genuine humour make him a brilliant 'Aladdin' – with the perfect combination of enthusiasm and sincerity. One of Melham's best moments is in the piece 'proud of your boy' where he gives a beautiful heartfelt solo accompanied by rich harmonic tones in the strings section.

Hiba Elchikhe plays fierce and independent 'Jasmine' with elegant gestural quirks and a blazing passion in all her dialogue, but is unfortunately somewhat lacking in vocal tone – and, although she hits the notes with accurate pitch, lacks the tonal richness needed to truly express the emotions behind each song – especially around the high notes where she tends to sound weak and watery. This is partially made up for in the powerful accompanying tones of the orchestra and backup singers who join in for many of the songs, but was a large let down in the central musical number 'a whole new world' which relies heavily on a rich vocal harmony in Jasmine's part.

Despite this discrepancy, 'Aladdin the Musical' is truly a great asset to the world of musical theatre and emanates professionalism from top to bottom. I definitely recommend seeing this fantastic performance.

## Aladdin the Musical

1992 Aladdin is one of Disney's most successful and most loved musicals of all time. The combination of Arabian and jazz music with Disney's trademark magical moments featured in songs such as "Friend like me" and "A Whole New World" make it



incredibly unique and difficult to recreate in the production theatre, requiring exceptional dancers and enthusiasm. As part of our music class assessment we were assigned the task of writing a review on Aladdin the Musical: The Broadway Show. It was a stellar experience, but while the musical delivers on the visual effects, the actors leave quite a bit to be desired.

This theatre adaptation of Aladdin was created by some of Disney's finest. Including Alan Menken's incredible score combined with Howard Ashman and Tim Rice's lyrics and the stunning choreography by Casey Nicholaw inspired by Arabian and Middle-Eastern dance. The story is about a street rat named Aladdin who finds a lamp containing an all-powerful genie ready to grant him with three wishes. He uses one of his wishes to impress his love interest by becoming a prince, but evil has other plans for the lamp. Eventually, he reveals himself as a thief rather than a Prince to Princess Jasmine who accepts him for who he is, and together they defeat the wicked Jafar.

This musical has already toured to the United States, United Kingdom, Germany, and Japan, while it has been recast for the Australian tour with an incredible ensemble of Australian dancers and musicians; unfortunately, the same cannot be said for the lead actors.

The sets and costumes felt as if they had been pulled straight out of the film and looked stunning. Traditional Arabian costuming, scantily clad men and women and a whole lot of glitter and gold created a real feast for the eyes. While the sets were heavily decorated and looked fantastic, sometimes it seemed as if the design team had too much fun soaking the entire set with shiny, sparkly gold and silver, occasionally making it unbearable to watch without getting a headache.

Each dance was more impressive than the next. The surprisingly small cast filled the stage perfectly and performed unbelievably synchronized Middle-Eastern dances that flowed with the music. It wasn't too overboard or too little and was extremely enjoyable to watch. Each song was energetic and made you want to jump out of your seat and just dance, although it lacked variety, often using a lot of loud repetitive jazz rhythms, which while funky, could occasionally become tiring.

Even with such marvelous dances, sets, and music, the cast is what ultimately holds the show together, and this is where some holes in the production began surfacing. While the genie was loads of fun,

both Aladdin and Jasmine lacked sufficient experience, which was quite evident in their scenes alone without the rest of the cast to keep things interesting.


Ainsley Melham who acts as Aladdin has previously appeared as minor characters or chorus in musicals including Ragtime, Violet, Crazy For You, How to Succeed in **Business Without Really Trying and** Into The Woods. While these may have been successful productions, he lacks the experience of being a lead, let alone the protagonist. His acting felt fake and forced and his singing, while not bad, did not have any kind of emotion. The same is to be said about Hiba Elchikhe as Jasmine who has only performed as an understudy in other major productions and sings for BBC radio.

Scenes between the two were almost a drag, and without the groovy music, visual effects or a fun-loving genie to back them up, it became very bland. In "A Whole New World" the best part was the flying carpet, not the song, further proving that the leads needed something to help them out. The singing just sounded strained and didn't create, an emotional connection with the audience as Disney's original film did.

Although not all the leads were disappointing. The genie: Michael James Scott stole the show and had astounding stage presence. He was hilarious and formed a bond with the audience making the show more interactive. My favourite scene by miles was his introduction in "Friend Like Me," which is still stuck in my head thanks to his flamboyant and enthusiastic nature. His incredible performance owes back to his many years of experience around the world in hit productions such as Mamma Mia!, All Shook Up, The Pirate Queen, Tarzan, The Broadway Boys and many more, while also being featured on highly respected shows such as The Tonight Show with Jimmy Fallon and The TONY Awards. This extravagant genie truly carried the show and made me fall in love with the musical as a whole.

Aladdin the Musical was a fun, family friendly performance, which while not jaw dropping was an excellent way to spend a day. The dance numbers, costumes, and sets were utter eye candy and the music was extremely catchy, and I will be humming the tunes for many weeks to come. While Aladdin and Jasmine could have been more experienced, every actor has to start somewhere, and if you can put them aside and focus on the overall production, it was wonderful. Not amazing, but still great. I definitely recommend booking tickets if you have children or feel like some classic Disney magic.

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
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

Lauren Cox (9Jo) was named 'Female Volleyball Athlete of the Year' at the Bendigo Academy of Sport dinner



#### Withdrawal of Students

Parents are reminded of Point 4 of the Business Regulations regarding withdrawal of students. 4. WITHDRAWAL OF STUDENTS

To withdraw a student from the School, at least one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation, must be given in writing to the Headmaster. If the required minimum notice of one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation period (in writing to the Headmaster), as described in the following examples, is not given for withdrawal from the School, a Tuition Withdrawal Fee equal to one tuition fee instalment will apply. There is no Prompt Payment Discount for a Tuition Withdrawal Fee. For example:

(a) Students leaving at the end of the school year (except Year 12 students) or during the following vacation or during First Term the following year will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster no later than 5 p.m. on the last school day of Third Term (in September).

(b) Students departing at the end of second Term or during Third Term will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster by the last school day of the First Term. Please also note that once the signed enrolment Form is received, and the first instalment of the Capital Fee is paid, the student is deemed to be enrolled in the School. Hence the notice of withdrawal period as described in Clause 4 is required to be given if a parent subsequently decides not to proceed.



EDUCATION

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

The annual CSEF amount per student is:

- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.



## EDUCATIONAL AND PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES 2017



Our School's Pastoral Care system includes my specialised services which include consultancy, counselling and educational assessments for students of all ages in both the Junior and Senior School.

The consultancy services involve regular meetings with the Pastoral Care team throughout the School. Staff present student issues for discussion and support plans are made collaboratively.

Counselling Services may be initiated by parents or staff. This generally involves matters which are complex, and possibly requiring Mental Health Care Plans from General Practitioners. Such issues may include stress management, separation, anxiety, depression and grief.

Educational Psychology assessment work may also be initiated by parents, but may also occur following teacher concerns being expressed to their Head of House, LRC staff or following consultation with myself. Early identification of Specific Learning Difficulties can do much to address student skill levels and to assist them achieving their potential.
