### FROM THE HEADMASTER

t has been a fortnight dominated by sport with the Senior School Athletics Carnival last week and the Junior School event this week. In the Senior School, Frew held the winning cup aloft for the 13th year in a row with Aherne cheering their way to victory in the Spirit Cup.

The undeniable highlight of the day was marked by hushed silence rather than rousing war cries. As School Captain, Joseph Baldwin, attempted to jump his personal best of 2.13 metres in the high jump, the whole school gathered to watch the spectacle and held their collective breath in silent respect. He may not have achieved his 'PB' but his graceful, loping runup followed by a seamlessly fluid leap into the air is a sight to behold and one that secures him a National ranking in the sport. This type of poised performance, coming from a student leader in the school is one of those memorable moments that will stay with Joseph and many other students for a long time.

Renowned child psychologist, Dr Michael Carr-Gregg spoke with Year 8 and Year 9 students and their parents this, and last week. This is always an engaging and incredibly informative session touching on the important issues that face adolescents as they move into adulthood. Sleep was one of Dr Carr-Gregg's prominent themes for the evening, imploring students not to underestimate the importance of rest and the degree to which sleep deprivation can undermine our daily lives.

Our parent sessions on the RULER approach also started last week. It is important for parents to understand that behind academic and other success at school, there must be a student wellbeing program that ensures every child is cared for and fits in. If the social-emotional approach that is taught at Girton is mirrored at home then students are in the best possible position to enjoy school and to do well at school.

As has become customary at Girton Grammar, hundreds of students attended ANZAC Day dawn services all over Bendigo, Castlemaine and beyond. These students attend ceremonies of their own volition and as always, their representation of the school at these events was impeccable. This year was particularly special, with Bailey Edwards (11 Millward) having the honour of reciting "In Flanders Fields" at the dawn service in Melbourne in front of 50,000 people. Bailey was chosen to recite the poem following a study tour to Greece as part of the Premier's Spirit of Anzac prize, which he won in February this year. Bailey's fine rendition of this moving poem by John McCrae epitomises the very best of being a Girtonian and we are very proud indeed.



The Senior School's own annual ANZAC ceremony was held in assembly on Tuesday with a magical rendition of 'Abide with Me' sung by a group of Year 11 and 12 students with Mr Paul Waldron, followed by a moving speech by retired Brigadier Steven Lee, AM.

Two final things. Firstly, thank you to all parents who made the time to meet their children's teachers this week at the parent-teacher interviews. An open dialogue between teachers and parents is incredibly important for every student and I encourage you to maintain this link as the year progresses.

And finally, the School Fair is this Sunday and dozens of people have worked tirelessly to make sure this is a fantastic day for all of Bendigo and a successful fundraiser for the School. Please do come along and importantly, bring friends and family and enjoy all that is on offer at this massive event.




# JUNIOR SCHOOL NEWS

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Michael Grose - Parenting Ideas by Mr Michael Grose,

Most dads are hard-wired to want their kids to improve.

When they play outside with their sons and daughters they'll invariably turn a game into a teaching session.

"Hold the ball a little firmer!"

"Sit up straighter and you'll balance better!"

"Keep your right arm straight and make sure you watch the ball!"

Sound familiar?

This teaching is well intentioned, as dads want their kids to do better.

A dad's enthusiasm to improve his son or daughter's performance isn't restricted to the backyard.

It often shows itself at children's sports events when he freely shares his knowledge and experience with his progeny.

Sometimes a dad's advice can do more harm than good. It can turn kids off sport and physical activity, particularly if he doesn't know when to stop.

Research shows that kids under the age of ten predominantly play sport for two reasons – fun and friendships. Winning and playing well tend to be more important for (male) adults than kids.

If you (or a dad you know) enthusiastically gives/shouts advice to your children when they're playing sport then here are six words to use instead:

### "I LOVETO WATCH YOU PLAY!"

Kids love it when their parents are interested in them and their activities. They are not so keen when parents become coaches.

If you want your child to continue playing sport into adolescence and beyond then be an enthusiastic supporter, not an enthusiastic coach.

It's hard for many blokes to restrict themselves to the support role as coaching is in their DNA. But that's no excuse. And we need to learn better ways if we want our kids to continue to enjoy participating in sport.

So start practising, "I love to watch you play!"

There, that's not so hard!



Nancy Tsou was born to a diplomatic family of the Republic of China (Taiwan). She started



learning the piano from the age of five, in Buenos Aires, Argentina. From an early age, she won many competitions in Taiwan as well as in Australia. She was awarded a scholarship to study at the Conservatorium, Melbourne University, where she gained a Master of Music degree. She has since taught at the Universities of Melbourne, Monash and

Wollongong, in addition to being a piano examiner for the AMEB.

"This is an amazing opportunity for students of music to learn some of the finer points from someone who has very much mastered their art and I am sure that Ms Tsou's visit will be memorable and inspiring for aspiring piano players," Mr Maruff said.

Year 10 and 11 students are invited to challenge themselves by sitting one or more of the four Australian Science Olympiad Exams now on offer.

Testing students' knowledge, critical thinking and problem solving skills, the exams are held in the disciplines of biology, earth and environmental science, chemistry and physics.

The exams last two hours and are carried out under strict examination conditions at school.

The Australian Science Olympiad exams are the first step in being selected to represent Australia at the International Science Olympiad.

### When are the Australian Science Olympiad Exams?

The exams are held in your school on the following days:

Chemistry: 3 August 2016

Earth & environmental science: 5 August 2016

Biology: 8 August 2016 Physics: 10 August 2016

### What is Olympiads Online?

Olympiads Online is free online support for students preparing to sit the Australian Science Olympiad Exams. At their own pace students work through past exam questions, receive feedback and monitor their progress.

### With Olympiads Online students can:

- assess their knowledge before they start
- work through quizzes of varying levels of difficulty
- discuss topics with other students on a moderated forum
- delve deeper with videos, links, glossaries and explanations of right and wrong answers from the experts
- monitor their progress and earn badges along the way.

### Cost

The cost is \$10 (plus GST) per student per exam. Students are welcome to sit more than one exam. Schools must register students in the exams.

Registration in the Earth and Environmental Science Olympiad Exam is free.



Parents are reminded of Point 4 of the Business Regulations regarding withdrawal of students. 4. WITHDRAWAL OF STUDENTS

To withdraw a student from the School, at least one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation, must be given in writing to the Headmaster. If the required minimum notice of one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation period (in writing to the Headmaster), as described in the following examples, is not given for withdrawal from the School, a Tuition Withdrawal Fee equal to one tuition fee instalment will apply. There is no Prompt Payment Discount for a Tuition Withdrawal Fee. For example:

(a) Students leaving at the end of the school year (except Year 12 students) or during the following vacation or during First Term the following year will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster no later than 5 p.m. on the last school day of Third Term (in September).

(b) Students departing at the end of second Term or during Third Term will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster by the last school day of the First Term. Please also note that once the signed enrolment Form is received, and the first instalment of the Capital Fee is paid, the student is deemed to be enrolled in the School. Hence the notice of withdrawal period as described in Clause 4 is required to be given if a parent subsequently decides not to proceed.

"My first solo flight was on a hot day and dealing with thermals when landing was the most shocking part of the experience.

"Taking off will always give me a euphoric feeling, to watch the ground grow distant and clouds closer.

"To my surprise I was very relaxed with the experience, the worry kicking in only after I had landed and taxied off the runway, to the hangar," Emma said.



# Message from the City of Greater Bendigo:

Parking and Animal Services from the City of Greater Bendigo have contacted our school and requested that the following information be conveyed to our school community.

The illegal parking of vehicles adjacent to our school poses a safety concern to children, pedestrians and other road users. Parents are reminded that it is essential to comply with parking restrictions when dropping off and collecting children from school.

Motorists must not stop in no stopping areas, even briefly, with or without the motor running. They must not stop next to a continuous yellow edge line, on nature strips, too close to school crossings, park over driveways or double park. A number of schools have short term time restricted areas, such as 2 minute pick up drop off. These parking areas are in place to allow for ease of access close to schools and these restrictions must be adhered to. Drivers should also be aware that they cannot perform a U-turn over an unbroken or continuous dividing line.

With regard to children's crossings, the law requires that a driver approaching a children's crossing must drive at a speed at which the driver can, if necessary stop safely before the crossing. Please slow down and take extra care when driving in school zones.

City of Greater Bendigo Parking Officers and Bendigo Police do conduct random patrols throughout the school year at various locations to ensure that motorists are adhering to the Road Rules.



# EDUCATIONAL AND PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES 2016



Our School's Pastoral Care system includes my specialised services which include consultancy, counselling and educational assessments for students of all ages in both Junior and Senior School.

The consultancy services involve regular meetings with the Pastoral Care team throughout the School. Staff present student issues for discussion and support plans are made collaboratively.

Counselling Services may be initiated by parents or staff. This generally involves matters which are complex, and possibly requiring Mental Health Care Plans from General Practitioners. Such issues may include stress management, separation, anxiety, depression and grief.

Educational Psychology assessment work may also be initiated by parents, but may also occur following teacher concerns being expressed to their Head of House, LRC staff or following consultation with myself. Early identification of Specific Learning Difficulties can do much to address student skill levels and to assist them achieving their potential.
