win its eleventh year, the ever growing One Act Play Festival was held last week in a full Black Box Theatre, where the audience was treated to eight wonderful plays, each a maximum of ten minutes in duration, created and often written by students from Year 7 to Year 12.

The Festival is the climax of the Co-curricular activity known as Actor's Studio, in which around 40 students currently take part.

From comedic pieces based on Monty Python and 'Goggle Box' viewers, to solemn stories about soldiers returning from WW1, this year's Festival highlighted a depth and breadth of collaboration and effort that makes 'art for art's sake' an obvious asset to the school.

Our Girton Racing Team returned from the Shell Eco Marathon in Singapore this week and has brought home with them a US\$3,000 Innovation Award for the ingenious thermo electric generator incorporated into the vehicle's exhaust system. During competition, the team managed to travel over 500km on one litre of fuel, an incredible effort, which put them 9th in the world and the highest performing school in an international field of over 50 vehicles.

The technical know-how of these dedicated students and the support of their families is phenomenal. They are the only school team in Australia to be invited to compete on the international stage and from fundraising to engineering their commitment to this co-curricular activity is extraordinary.

The Senior School Athletics' Carnival was also held yesterday and it was Jones House who this year won the ubiquitous Sprit Cup while Frew was the overall Carnival Cup winner. All House Captains led their teams with gusto and pride, with some outstanding performances on the track and many memorable moments trackside.



Next week is Camps' Week in Senior School and students from Year 7 to 11 will head off all over Victoria and immerse themselves in a range of outdoor activities whilst strengthening their relationships with their teachers and peers, including older students who will attend various trips as camp leaders.

Camps Week provides a safe environment for fun and adventure, creating memories that stay with students for a lifetime. Without necessarily realising it, students will be involved in skills-focused learning, problem solving and team building. Outdoor activities provide valuable noncompetitive avenues for achievement, as well as opportunities to develop independence, self-reliance and leadership experience.

This will be the final edition of eLink before the Term 1 holidays so I wish all Girton students and families a very enjoyable and safe Easter.

FROM THE HEAD OF JUNIOR SCHOOL

When potential parents come in to interview for their child or children to take up a position in Junior School there are many aspects of school life that are discussed. Of course academic success and a safe learning environment are very high on the list of topics as is the breadth of curricular and co-curricular opportunities that are available for our students. One area of discussion that gives us, as a school, much pride, is the positive community culture that has been developed over time. This culture of caring for one another, acting responsively when things go wrong, understanding different perspectives and taking responsibility for ourselves, our school and the greater community are central to the positive school culture that exists at Girton.

Last Friday this was evident in practice when a group of our Year Six students stood on stage in front of the whole school and had their heads shaved to raise money for, and awareness of, the Leukaemia Foundation. The Girton Racing Team (GRT) began their 2017 Victorian Human Powered Vehicle (HPV) Series campaign in fine style at the recent Casey Fields 6 Hour event. To kick off Round One of the Vic Series, the three GRT teams were made up of

predominantly experienced riders. The few first-time GRT members who did compete excelled in every way, and pleasingly several noncompeting team members and their family attended the Casey event to offer their support. Scrutineering for this event was conducted a week prior, with race organisers meeting members of the GRT at the Tom Flood Sports Centre here in Bendigo. This meant that any last-minute fixes or modifications were not an issue, in the usually small amount of time between arrival and race start at the event. It is quite a journey from Bendigo to the Casey Fields', purpose-built race track.

On a perfect day for HPV racing all three teams; Team Infusion (Middle Secondary), Team Introuble (Middle Secondary) and Team Intrepid (Senior Secondary), were very keen to start the season of competition. After the mandatory Race Controlled rolling start it was down to racing. Prior to this mechanical problem, Introuble was positioned in the top two of the Middle Secondary category. They were racing very strongly but, the newly refurbished, lighter trike was taking a little bit of getting used to, especially in the bottom left-hand sweeping corner of the track. The Season 2017 paint scheme began to look very untidy.

By race end, celebrations rang out under the Girton Grammar marquee with Team Intrepid securing a round one win in Senior Secondary. This team, made up of

SEMA UPDATE

It hardly seems like a year since the 2016 Eco Marathon in the Philippines, but time flies when you are busy with deadlines and having fun at the same time.

Over the last few months, the team has been concentrating on testing and training in readiness for Singapore. Considerable time has been spent changing the fuel system settings on the vehicle in pursuit of the most economical 'sweet spot' for fuel consumption, but the final tune up will not occur until we are under real conditions in Singapore.

The team have tested the vehicle and driver under varying weather conditions that culminated in an extremely hot 42 degree day where the cockpit temperature reached 53 degrees. Fortunately the driver and vehicle survived that extreme test and the team came away buoyed with results. The weather expected in Singapore is significantly different to Bendigo with temperatures consistently in the low 30's but humidity approaching 100%.

The vehicle, spares and tools were finally packed into the shipping crate and delivered to the air freight company late last month as the countdown began to our departure day. With just over two weeks to go there were still a few spare components to be completed and a couple of last minute purchases to be made before the team were comfortable that they were fully prepared.

Finally, with some free time on their hands, the team decided to test their driving skills in a go karting evening last weekend. The racing was fast and very competitive with each team member scoring good lap times, some within a half second of the track record!

With the departure set for March 14, team members are trying to contain their excitement while packing their bags for the great adventure in Singapore. The event begins at midday on Wednesday March 15 where the team will put their vehicle through the arduous technical and safety inspections prior to being permitted to take to the track. Official practice sessions begin on Thursday, with competition runs scheduled to start Friday afternoon and culminating on Sunday afternoon. An awards ceremony on Sunday night will bring conclusion to the event, with the team travelling home on Monday evening.

Withdrawal of Students

Parents are reminded of Point 4 of the Business Regulations regarding withdrawal of students. 4. WITHDRAWAL OF STUDENTS

To withdraw a student from the School, at least one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation, must be given in writing to the Headmaster. If the required minimum notice of one complete term's notice, including the preceding vacation period (in writing to the Headmaster), as described in the following examples, is not given for withdrawal from the School, a Tuition Withdrawal Fee equal to one tuition fee instalment will apply. There is no Prompt Payment Discount for a Tuition Withdrawal Fee. For example:

(a) Students leaving at the end of the school year (except Year 12 students) or during the following vacation or during First Term the following year will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster no later than 5 p.m. on the last school day of Third Term (in September).

(b) Students departing at the end of second Term or during Third Term will need to have provided notice in writing to the Headmaster by the last school day of the First Term. Please also note that once the signed enrolment Form is received, and the first instalment of the Capital Fee is paid, the student is deemed to be enrolled in the School. Hence the notice of withdrawal period as described in Clause 4 is required to be given if a parent subsequently decides not to proceed.

THE GIRTON GRAMMAR WHOLE SCHOOL CHARTER

The Emotional Intelligence Charter is a vision developed jointly by Girton Grammar School students and staff. It includes ways we can learn together and interact positively by providing a catalogue of agreed-upon behaviours that everyone in the school aspires to uphold. Because it is a collaborative effort, this Charter helps everyone to connect genuinely with each

other.

Ultimately, the Charter facilitates a sense of safety, comfort, belonging, and empowerment to all who contributed to its creation. Over 870 students and staff contributed to this development.

Accompanying the Charter are the cornerstone values we will be asking students to explore. These values take the form of badges and each child and staff member in our school has already received

THE GIRTON GRAMMAR WHOLE SCHOOL CHARTER

Staff will work with students on these badge values so that students develop an age appropriate understanding of what each badge represents.

There is no stipulation on wearing a badge every day but students must wear them at formal occasions such as Foundation Day, Carols Service and Speech Night.

Students will only ever receive one badge. However a unique quality of this

badge is that it may be swapped with a peer or an adult once a year but with one stipulation. To swap a badge, a student must have a member of staff present and hear the student explain what it means to wear "Imagine Trust" or "Imagine Respect" as they hand it over to their friend.

From Week Two of Term One any lost or broken badges can be replaced via Morey reception or Junior School reception but will require parent permission for the badge cost to be added to the school account.



Our staff are committed to developing these values and we will work with students on the Charter and Badge values throughout the year. Students are asked to wear their badge with pride.

We encourage parents to openly discuss your child's badge with them. The badge will be a talking point and wearing a badge means staff, students and the community will ask students what it stands for. We expect students can,



in time, answer this confidently and give examples of behaviours that identify their badge.

Country Bus Service

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

Every Victorian child should have access to the world of learning opportunities that exist beyond the classroom. The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps ensure that no student will miss out on the opportunity to join their classmates for important, educational and fun activities. It is part of making Victoria the Education State and the Government's commitment to breaking the link between a student's background and their outcomes.

CAMPS, SPORTS & EXCURSIONS FUND (CSEF)

School camps provide children with inspiring experiences in the great outdoors, excursions encourage a deeper understanding of how the world works and sports teach teamwork, discipline and leadership. All are part of a healthy curriculum.

CSEF will be provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps and sporting activities.

If you hold a valid means-tested concession card or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible for CSEF. A special consideration category also exists for asylum seeker and refugee families. The allowance is paid to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions or sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

- The annual CSEF amount per student is:
- \$125 for primary school students
- \$225 for secondary school students.

EDUCATIONAL AND PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES 2017



Our School's Pastoral Care system includes my specialised services which include consultancy, counselling and educational assessments for students of all ages in both the Junior and Senior School.

The consultancy services involve regular meetings with the Pastoral Care team throughout the School. Staff present student issues for discussion and support plans are made collaboratively.

Counselling Services may be initiated by parents or staff. This generally involves matters which are complex, and possibly requiring Mental Health Care Plans from General Practitioners. Such issues may include stress management, separation, anxiety, depression and grief.

Educational Psychology assessment work may also be initiated by parents, but may also occur following teacher concerns being expressed to their Head of House, LRC staff or following consultation with myself. Early identification of Specific Learning Difficulties can do much to address student skill levels and to assist them achieving their potential.
